Rochester chosen as location for third annual #DouglassWeek, celebrating the legacy of Frederick Douglass, July 10-16

Today, July 5, is the anniversary of Douglass's famous speech, "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?" — which was delivered in Rochester

ROCHESTER, N.Y. — Rochester will host the third annual #DouglassWeek, happening July 10-16 in celebration of the legacy and inspiration of famed and revered abolitionist, author, and orator Frederick Douglass. The inaugural #DouglassWeek celebration took place in Ireland in 2021 and last year in Washington, D.C. #DouglassWeek is a creative series of more than 40 in-person and virtual talks, performances, and events that celebrates the life and achievements of Frederick Douglass, the Douglass family, and other historical and present-day changemakers.

Douglass lived in Rochester for 25 of his most-active years, publishing *The North Star* newspaper here and buried by choice at Mt. Hope Cemetery. Douglass said, "I shall always feel more at home there (Rochester) than anywhere else in the country." Douglass escaped enslavement and rose up to become an advisor to three U.S. presidents, incuding Abraham Lincoln, and was the most photographed person of the 19th century.

News of #DouglassWeek is being announced today, on what is the 171st anniversary of Douglass's famous speech, "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?" — a masterful and scathing indictment of slavery in America delivered on July 5, 1852, at Rochester's Corinthian Hall. Douglass had a decisive impact on America's path to abolishing slavery, and his work laid the foundation for the modern civil rights movement in the country

Rochester in-person activities include talks on the Underground Railroad, a 5K walk/run, a family-friendly community event, a commemoration at the Frederick Douglass gravesite, a photography walk ("Insta Walk") that celebrates visual storytelling, and the "Harmonies of Freedom" stage performance Saturday eve, celebrating the Douglass legacy at the Hochstein Performance Hall, featuring dancers and Broadway performers. The co-organizers of #DouglassWeek are Dr. Caroline Dunham-Schroeter and Kristin M. Leary. Among their partners are the Frederick Douglass Family Initiatives (FDFI), a nonprofit organization founded by Douglass descendants and headquartered in Rochester.

"We are delighted to be able to commemorate the life of Frederick Douglass and his efforts to abolish slavery and change the future for generations to come," said Dunham-Schroeter. "We believe it's vital to bring these stories to the locations where he had an impact during his lifetime and explore what the Douglass family stories mean to contemporary issues of identity, race,

independence and equal rights around the world."

FDFI was co-founded by Kenneth B. Morris Jr., Douglass's great-great-great-grandson. Morris and his mother, Nettie Washington Douglass, will be in attendance at events during #DouglassWeek in Rochester, a city he described "so important" to his family. "We hope many people can join us to commemorate my great-great-great grandfather and all he stood for and achieved throughout his life," Morris said.

History of #DouglassWeek

The annual weeklong celebration commemorates Frederick Douglass and others whose legacies continue to influence efforts to create a more just world. The week is organized by the U.S. nonprofit organization The Globe Lane Initiative, which is named for the lane housing the venue where Douglass first spoke in Cork, Ireland, in 1845. The group works with a network of Douglass scholars, historians, and researchers, along with artists, musicians, poets, community groups, and activists from around the world.

Participants in #DouglassWeek respond to the story of Douglass and other changemakers through historical, creative, academic, cultural and other lenses to describe the influence of history on contemporary topics and conversations. "By remembering and honoring our history and the Douglass legacy," said co-organizer Leary, "we hope to influence and inspire transformative change today."

The Ireland connection: Rochester is Sister City to Waterford, Ireland, where Douglass delivered a powerful speech on Oct. 8, 1845, when he was traveling throughout Ireland and Britain as part of a two-year speaking tour. He delivered speeches denouncing slavery and raised funds for the abolitionist cause in the United States. He had escaped enslavement just seven years earlier at the age of 20, and described his time in Ireland as "transformative" and key to the development of his political thinking. A plaque commemorating Douglass' speech in Waterford was unveiled in 2013. During Douglass's time in Britain, he befriended Anna, Henry, and Ellen Richardson, who ultimately raised the money to purchase his freedom in America.

Several collaborative projects commemorate Frederick Douglass's journeys, notably the Cork Abolitionists Trail, a walking trail of sites where Douglass lived and spoke during his time in the city. It is part of the Globe Lane Initiative's Journeys for Freedom project and generously supported by The Irish Government Emigrant Support Programme and Cork City Council.

#DouglassWeek 2023 further unites Ireland and the United States in celebrating Douglass and other changemakers, with partnering organizations in Washington, D.C. and Cork, Waterford, Wexford, and Belfast in Ireland. In March 2023, then-Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork Colm Kelleher visited Rochester and Washington, D.C. to expand the connections between Cork and the two cities, and #DouglassWeek 2023 will also highlight the special Sister City relationship between Rochester and Waterford.

Douglass returned home to America in 1847 and immediately moved his family to Rochester, where he raised his children with his wife, Anna Murray Douglass, and continued a remarkable career as a writer, orator, diplomat, journalist, advisor, suffragist, and champion for civil and human rights around the world.
